Mark Adderley

Mark is an Experienced Trainer, Executive Coach, Consultant and Highly Experienced People and Transformation Director, with over 30 years' experience in HE, private, public and not-for-profit sectors in Europe, Middle- and Far-East Asia. This includes Strategy Consulting (1988-94), Royal Bank of Scotland (1992-2002), Scottish Water (2002-7), the National Trust for Scotland (2007-8), NHS (2009-2011), and Heriot-Watt University (2011-2018).

Mark had been a Chief-Executive, Executive and a Non-Executive Director for over 20 years, understanding governance, compliance and strategic insights needed at the top of organisations. He has been in HR or People director roles for the majority of those, leading the HR function, HR strategy and people-related change from the inside, working with executive teams to deliver organisational strategy through its people.

Mark is an independent coach, qualified facilitator and mediator with a passion to deliver. He coaches and develops leaders and leadership teams in the Private and Commercial, Health, Higher Education, Biotech, Digital and other sectors including Principal, Chief Officers, DVC and PVC, Director, Head of Function, Head of Department, Heads of Faculty and other senior executives

As an experienced leader, he understands the context within which senior managers in HE make decisions and has stood in places similar to where they stand. He has a detailed and strategic understanding of organisations and has real experience at the senior team table, and a problem-solving mindset. Before that he worked in local government and after graduating undertook a wide variety of community and volunteering work including with children, homeless people and in care homes.

His University current role includes senior leadership responsibility for the University's social responsibility and sustainability activities, as well as strategic advice and delivery on climate change issues, energy, supply chains and human rights, responsible investment and social investment, environmental policy and regulation and community engagement. Dave is a Chartered Environmentalist and Chartered Manager and a fellow of the EAUC - Alliance for Sustainability Leadership in Education.

Alastair Sim
Director, Universities Scotland



Alastair Sim has been Director of Universities Scotland since July 2009, joining from the Scottish Civil Service. The Director has chief executive responsibility for the management of the organisation.

Since 2009 he has built the Universities Scotland team and supported members through two Scottish election, three general elections, two referendums, several spending reviews, the student support review, the Scottish Government's project on the learner journey and preparation for Brexit. He has represented Universities Scotland in Parliament and in the media and has served on many committees and working groups developing policy affecting higher education.

As a senior civil servant, Alastair developed new Scottish legislation on protection of the natural environment and on constitutional reform and was most latterly Director of Policy and Strategy at the [Scottish Courts](#) before joining Universities Scotland. Among other roles he served as Private Secretary to Ministers in the Commons and the Lords.

Alastair holds degrees from [Oxford](#), [Delaware](#) and [Glasgow](#) universities (where he was a student and an executive director at the same time) and studied for the CIPR Diploma in Public Affairs at Queen Margaret University. He has had two thrillers published: *Rosslyn Blood* (2004) and *The Unbelievers* (2009).

Alastair holds a number of non-executive board positions at [Scottish Credit and Qualifications Framework Partnership](#) (since 2009), [Scottish Council for Development and Industry](#) (since 2020) and is an Advisory Board Member for [Disclosure Scotland](#) (since January 2023).



Dr Sandy Brownlee

Senior Lecturer in Computing, University of Stirling; AI co-lead for the Scottish Informatics and Computer Science Alliance (SICSA)



Dr Brownlee leads the Data Science and Intelligent Systems Research Group in Stirling, and is also AI co-lead for the Scottish Informatics and Computer Science Alliance (SICSA). He holds a BSc and PhD in Computing Science, and worked as software engineer in industry, and in the Civil Service, before returning to academia in 2010.

His research interest focuses on "explainable" AI spanning both optimisation and machine learning: making automated approaches for solving difficult problems explain their reasoning to help people make better decisions. He has applied these methods in transportation, civil engineering, software engineering, and healthcare.

Dr. David Telford

Executive Director of Information Services, University of Stirling



At the heart of the University of Stirling's technological and digital advancements, Dr. David Telford leads as the Executive Director of Information Services. His role encompasses the oversight of IT, Library Services, Programme Management, as well as Digital Skills and Academic Development. With a wide experience in the field, David has contributed significantly as a member of the JISC committee's and served as the Chair of ucisa, a key membership body for digital sectors in education.

David's career is marked by a dedication to leveraging technology in enhancing both staff and student experiences. He champions the transformative power of technology in optimising business operations and, crucially, in digital's positive impact in elevating the quality of research and academic activities. David's interest includes how people share knowledge tacitly and explicitly and how digital can make accessible data, information, and knowledge.



Dr Leonardo Bezerra
Lecturer in AI & Data Science, University of Stirling



Dr Leonardo Bezerra joined the University of Stirling as a Lecturer in Artificial Intelligence (AI)/Data Science in 2023, after having been a Lecturer in Brazil for the past 7 years. He received his Ph.D. degree from Université Libre de Bruxelles (Belgium) in 2016, having defended a thesis on the automated design of multi-objective evolutionary algorithms. His research experience spans from applied data science projects with public and private institutions to supervising theses on automated and deep machine learning. Recently, his research has concentrated on the social impact of AI applications, such as disinformation through social media recommendation algorithms and the disruptive potential of generative AI.

Donna McMillan
Vice Principal (Governance) and University Secretary, University of the West of Scotland (UWS)



As Vice-Principal (Governance) and the University Secretary of the University of the West of Scotland, Donna heads the Court and Senate Office and has Executive responsibility for corporate governance as the Secretary to the Court and academic governance as the Secretary to Senate, as well as leading on Legal Services and Risk and Resilience.

The Vice-Principal (Governance) and University Secretary ensures the University meets its legislative and regulatory responsibilities, oversees all constitutional and ceremonial matters for the University, including arrangements for the Chancellor, and promotes the history and heritage of the Institution. With significant experience in higher education, Donna has previously led on institutional Quality Assurance & Enhancement, Health & Safety and Registry.

Donna has a Master's degree in Law (LLM) and an Honours degree in History & English Literature.



Patrick Hackett
Registrar, Secretary and Chief Operating Officer, The University of Manchester



Patrick Hackett took up on 1 October 2018 his current role as Registrar, Secretary and Chief Operating Officer at The University of Manchester, where he leads just under 6,000 Professional Services (PS) staff and is a member of the Senior Leadership Team.

Previously Patrick was Deputy Vice-Chancellor at The University of Liverpool, a position he held from August 2013. Whilst in this role he contributed to the development of a new institutional strategy, 'Towards 2026'; led the Strategic Change programme to deliver new strategic objectives; and developed a new vision of 'one PS'.

From November 2008 Patrick was Chief Operating Officer at Liverpool. In this capacity Patrick undertook a fundamental review of the Professional Services and designed a new PS unitary organisation model that has been adopted by other institutions; he delivered reviews of Council, Senate and senior committees with subsequent major changes to improve governance and effectiveness; and he was responsible for the University's strategic commercial and business relationship with Laureate Inc., a private sector for-profit global higher education provider, which grew the University's highly successful online presence to over 10,000 students. He was a founding Director of Xi'an Jiaotong Liverpool University in Suzhou, China, that was established in 2006 and oversaw its growth to over 12,000 students.

An architect by profession, Patrick has a BArch from University College Dublin and has also previously held senior leadership positions at The University of Reading and Royal Holloway, University of London. Additionally, he has been a consultant, advising higher education institutions across the UK on facilities management organisation and development and the delivery of major capital projects.

Patrick was a non-Executive Director of Aintree University Hospital NHS trust for six years until the end of March 2015 and he was also a Trustee Director of the University of Liverpool Pension Fund until 2018.



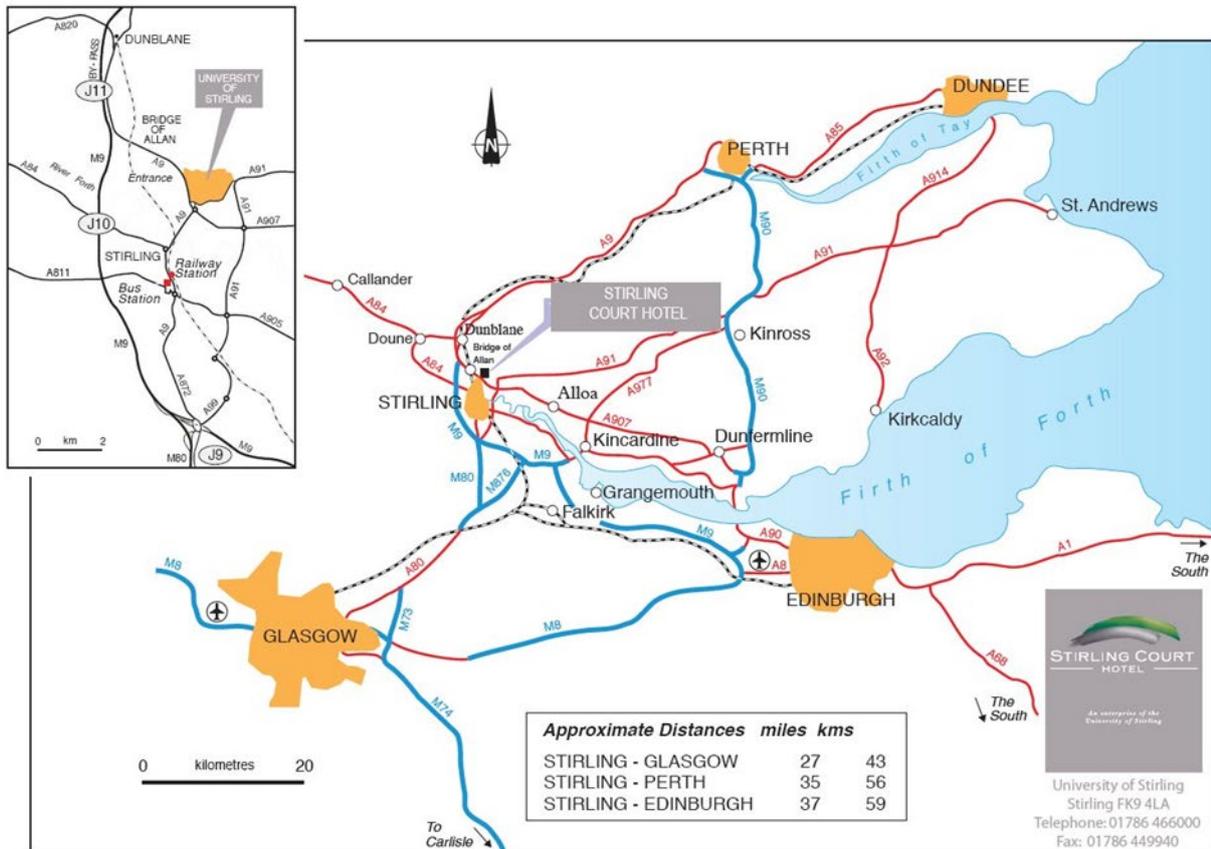

Find Stirling Court Hotel

Stirling Court Hotel is just two miles from the centre of Stirling in central Scotland. It is served by excellent fast public transport links from Glasgow and Edinburgh; and easily accessible by bus, foot and bike from Stirling's centre.

To find the best way to travel to and from the hotel click [HERE](#). This will take you to the University of Stirling website and will show you a map of the area and give you the opportunity to search all available transport options.

Visitors to Stirling Court Hotel who choose to bring their car should note the following directions:

From the East, South or West take the M9 to Junction 11. At the junction, there is a roundabout which marks the end of the M9. From here you should take the exit for Bridge of Allan, follow the road through the town itself, and after about 200 metres you will find the University entrance on the left.

From the North take the A9 to the same roundabout and follow the same route through Bridge of Allan as above.

Stirling Court Hotel - Car Parking

Stirling Court Hotel has 150 complimentary car parking spaces. These are operated on a first come first serve basis. Parking in the Hotel car park is free to our guests. A barrier system is in operation however **guests must also input their car registration number immediately upon entering the hotel.** If you don't submit your car registration on arrival this will result in a private parking notice. Please see the link below for more details:

If the barrier is up, guests should just proceed on into the car park and register their car details on the tablets situated at the front desk.

If the barrier is down, guests should take a ticket that will be issued and then register their car details on the tablets situated at the front desk. Upon departure, the team at the Hotel's front desk will issue guests with a ticket that they can use at the barrier to get out.

Charges apply for parking on the main campus. Please note that at certain times demand for our car parking spaces may exceed supply:-

- Parking charges apply Monday to Friday, 9.00am to 5.00pm, all year round (excluding Christmas and New Year's Day). Visitors can pay for parking through the [RingGo app](#) or over the phone. More information (including parking tariffs) can be found on our [visitor parking information page](#).
- Blue badge holders are not required to Pay and display.
- Pay and Display Rates:
 - up to 2 hours free
 - 2 to 4 hours £2.00
 - 4+ hours £4.00

Electric vehicles

There are two electric vehicle charging stations located within Cottrell Main Car Park and at the rear of the Pathfoot Building. There are four designated spaces allowing up to four electric cars to recharge simultaneously.

Charges are not free, but costs £0.16p per kWh, with an overstay fee of £5 after 4 hours, and every 30 mins thereafter. Users are also still required to display a valid parking permit or Pay and Display ticket.

A maximum charging time of 4 hours applies following which time users are requested to move their vehicles to an alternative designated parking space.
